First (Spring) Term 2009 Report



The Kaghan Memorial School's first Spring Term has been an exciting one for all involved. The School is now in full operation. We have an experienced and motivated teaching faculty, all of whom come highly recommended from their previous employers and who have impressed considerably with what they have already achieved with their respective classes at KMS. Most importantly of all, we have a happy and eager collection of students who arrive each day with a smile and leave having gained that extra bit in class.

Towards the end of the Spring Term, at the request of the Trustees, the teaching faculty elected a Head Teacher amongst themselves. I am pleased to say that my colleagues voted for me to fill this position for the remainder of the 2009 School Year, and it is through this role that I have been privileged to witness first-hand the progress made by all the students of the Kaghan Memorial School. This development has been in leaps and bounds, with each class also wonderfully manifesting its own unique character over time. The following is a brief class-by-class description of the students' achievements over the Spring Term.

Class Kindergarten A

Niamh Honohan succeeded Shireen Lakhani as the teacher of Kindergarten A. Building on their advances in the Foundation Term, these students made great progress. After learning all the sounds of the alphabet, they started to read small words and simple books. They mastered numbers one to fifty and also learnt how to add numbers below ten, measure length and height, and to recognise and make patterns on their own. All of the KG A students love games time. Their coordination and skill at throwing and catching balls has improved immensely, with most of the students able to throw a volley.



Class Kindergarten B

The class that I taught, Kindergarten B, has also made excellent progress since starting in April 2009. These students learnt the sounds of the alphabet and numbers one to ten with much enthusiasm and action. They particularly enjoyed exploration in Science class. Their interest in all things crawly was visible in their regular drawings of spiders and insects. Most subjects were supported with a range of songs which were eagerly sung and obviously enjoyed by the students. This has quickly helped the children increase their English vocabulary. Urdu and Islamiat were also particular favourites of these children as they were able to learn in their national tongue.


The Managing Trustee's Column

Dear Friends and Supporters of KMT,

We hope that you like this new format for our newsletter; with the start of the new financial year in July, we thought it was time for a new look. But developments in this quarter have not been limited to cosmetic makeovers only. The launch of the School during the previous year increased KMT's workload considerably as we now have to manage operations at the School in addition to raising

finances for, and continuing with, the ongoing construction work. We therefore realised that there was a real need to expand the Board of Trustees this year and to bring in some more dedicated individuals to help establish KMT on a firm footing and to assist with our growing responsibilities. Finding such people who are willing to commit selflessly to a cause is normally easier said than done, but in this case we were extremely fortunate. By August, as a result of an active process of identifying a handful of potential candidates and approaching and discussing the option of a Trusteeship with them, we had the privilege of securing the support of two successful and respected members of Islamabad society, Mohsin Hayat, a Financial Markets Manager, and Ali Bajwa, a senior Telecom Executive. Both have agreed to serve on our Board for three years and we are happy to have the opportunity to introduce them to you through this newsletter.

The arrival of these new Trustees came none too soon. Whereas the 2008-2009 year had gone very well, and whereas the Trust accomplished a lot in that year, the first quarter of this new fiscal year was difficult. The impact of the Global Financial Crisis was being increasingly felt by the Pakistani business community, and Pakistan was reeling under its own crisis of millions of Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) fleeing conflict in the Swat District. Both these factors had a direct impact on KMT; corporations tightened their budgets in the face of mounting losses, and whatever reduced allocations they maintained for charitable causes were all committed (and rightly so) to helping the IDPs through their emergency. Corporate donations that had been the backbone of KMT's fundraising drive for the past three years dried up almost overnight, as commitments and pledges that had been made to us several months ago were suddenly put on hold or withdrawn outright. This directly and severely affected our development plans, and we had no option but to suspend all but the most essential construction work at the School in August. The situation was showing no sign of improvement by the end of the quarter, and it is clear that the expanded Board and the KMT Head Office team will have a real challenge on their hands with fundraising for the foreseeable future. The only silver lining in terms of fundraising during this quarter was the "Sponsor a Child" Programme, which continued to do reasonably well, bringing in much needed finances that KMT used to cover operational costs at the School and its Head Office.



Student Profile



Zafran Ali KG A

Zafran is a curious and bright child with a penchant for mischief. He has been a student at KMS since the beginning of the

Foundation Term and has made great progress in all subjects. His home is in the small village of Bela Sacha, situated 10km from the School and serviced by a dirt road that often closes due to landslides caused by heavy rain.

Despite a few absences due to the closure of the road, Zafran is still one of the top students in his class for both letters and numbers. He enjoys art, and meticulously colours the pictures presented to him as well as those he draws himself. His personal preference is for anything bright, especially orange and yellow. Previously a distant and suspicious child, the time and attention that his teachers have given him has paid off: Zafran has emerged as an affectionate and sweet child. He has learnt to trust his teachers and to

respond by playing an active role in class games and activities. He has also emerged as one for surprises, once calling over his teacher just to startle her by releasing a fly from the palm of his hand.

Zafran lives with his father, a labourer, his mother and five siblings. His older sister, Amina, is a Grade 1 student in KMS. His family survives on a very low income. Their family is hopeful that by sending their children to the Kaghan Memorial School they will have a brighter and more financially stable future.



Class 1A

The children recalled, without prompting, an impressive amount of what they had learnt three months earlier. All the hard work in the previous term had clearly paid off. In English, they started to read first words and then sentences. Towards the end of the term, with great excitement and pride, the students realised that they could in fact read entire books. In Maths, they developed an understanding of basic addition. In Geography, the students made a class map showing the location of their house in the valley. In

Lauren Allen took on the role of 1B class teacher. As had been the case with the students starting in the Foundation Term, the children settled in well and started to learn English at a rapid pace. They began to read words and excitedly read the names and titles of books and products all around the School. Of all the classes in the School, they emerged as the most eager singers and can often be heard singing in English or Urdu.

AKEA finances KMS Meals



AKEA is a US-based startup company focused on health and wellness. Their mission is to help families live life well. They have partnered with many experts, including Sally Beare, a long-time affiliate of KMT, to study longevity hot spots around the world, one of which happens to be Hunza, Pakistan. They look at the diets and lifestyles of the people in these regions to find out why they live happier, longer and more fulfilling lives than the majority of individuals in the rest of the world. AKEA's goal is to have a fundamental impact on the health and wellness of people by introducing them to the

lessons learnt from these longevity hot spots in a practical way that can be incorporated into their everyday lives.

As reported in our Summer 2009 newsletter, KMT provides free school meals to the students of KMS in an effort to address and counter the malnourishment prevalent amongst many of the children. AKEA has generously supported KMT in this endeavour by donating US\$ 2500 towards the costs of these meals. This contribution covers the meal costs at the School for one term this year, and it ensures that every one of the 130 children at the School receives at least one substantial and healthy meal each school day.

KMS Teachers conduct a Curriculum Selection Workshop



The Trustees of KMT have always been single-minded in their determination that KMS maintain high standards of teaching. The original decision to recruit international volunteer teachers for the School was one step in the effort to achieve high standards whilst keeping costs low. Another imperative for quality education is to adopt and implement a good teaching model and curriculum.

The students of KMS are in a unique situation: coming from deprived backgrounds, living with parents with little or no education, having no knowledge of, or exposure to, English, and with little access to objects common in today's world (e.g. televisions, computers, even toys). Consequently, special consideration needs to be taken when deciding on how to introduce them into a modern educational system.

It had therefore been agreed by the KMT Trustees long before the School started that a tailor-made curriculum would be required for at least the initial classes. This curriculum would have to recognise and cater for the realities of the limited exposure of these children, while preparing them over the years to transition to a mainstream British educational model in high school.

Prior to the S c h o o l's opening, an exercise had b e e n conducted in late 2007 by KMT to start the curriculum s e l e c t i o n

process for the first two grades of KMS, Kindergarten and Grade 1. A team of three international volunteers was brought in on a short-term assignment to conduct a study of various teaching models and curricula in use in some of the better schools in Pakistan (including international schools) and to also look at teaching practices and syllabi being

promoted by some of the leading international educational institutions such as the British Council and the United States Educational Foundation. The team compiled a study report for KMT at the conclusion of their assignment.

With the launch of the School in September 2008, it was agreed with the teachers that they would develop their

would experiment with what teaching methods worked best with the children under their tutelage. This would be the second step of the curriculum selection exercise i.e. getting a feel of the learning curve of the children in response to various teaching techniques. Based on their practical in-class experiences, and using the original Curriculum Study

Report left by the previous team of volunteers as a starting reference, the KMS team would then start the third phase of the curriculum selection exercise. This third stage would involve a second study and review of the prevalent teaching models, curricula and syllabi, this time by the KMS teaching team itself, and expanded to cover Grade 2 also. Based on this review, the teachers would present their recommendations on their proposed curriculum for Kindergarten to Grade 2.

This second study was conducted by the teaching team in August, and at its conclusion, a first draft curriculum was presented by them in a Workshop that also included KMT Trustees and a group of external educationalists from the Education Department, the British Council and De Laas Gul (DLG - an NGO with over 20 years experience in the field of education) invited specifically to lend their perspectives to the discussions. The workshop presented an opportunity for an exhaustive review of,

and discussion on, the proposed curriculum, the essence of which was a combination of the British and Pakistani curricula, with adjustments made where needed. At the conclusion of the workshop, which was appreciated by all concerned for the effort put in by the teachers, it was agreed that a second draft of the curriculum would be prepared after incorporating all the suggestions and recommendations put forth and agreed upon during the workshop. This second draft will be presented in a second workshop that will be
