Another academic year successfully concluded at KMS

The Kaghan Memorial School completed another successful academic year in December. One of the major highlights of the year was the sanctioning of the Junior School curriculum (Kindergarten to Grade 5) that was presented to the Board of Trustees and to invited external educationalists earlier in the summer. The newly approved teaching programme was then successfully implemented in the school during the second term of the year as lessons ran smoothly, student assessments were conducted on a regular basis and exams were formally introduced at KMS for the first time, with the children sitting for their mid-term and end of term papers.

Formal training and capacity-building exercises were also introduced for the local teaching team at the school by the international STAs (Senior Teachers and Academic Advisors). These included bi-weekly ESOL classes and a series of in-house Teacher Training workshops. The workshops focused on a number of different areas such as lesson plan writing and differentiation, cross curricular planning, classroom management and etiquette, and responsibility and ownership in the classroom. Extensive teacher performance management reviews

(inclusive of classroom observation) of every local teacher and teaching assistant were conducted, followed by progress meetings, detailed feedback, and the setting of individual aims and objectives for each individual local teacher.

As KMS focuses not just on in-class education but also on the co-curricular and extra-curricular development of its students, the house system that was introduced during AY 2010 was strengthened during 2011, with students and staff taking their house pride very seriously. To keep the friendly competition alive throughout the year, several inter-house activities were conducted on a regular basis with the children representing their houses not only in sporting events such as tug of war and cricket, but also in other positive activities such as litter picks around the school. Further on the subject of developing environmental awareness and responsibility amongst the children, KMS also participated in an environmental day organised by the Environment Protection Fund in collaboration with the Lahore Grammar School (LGS), during which KMS students teamed up with visiting LGS students to conduct a litter-picking exercise in the popular tourist resort town of Shogran.

All in all, we can report with satisfaction that school has come along positively during the year, with considerable progress made in improving the content and quality of its educational programme. The KMT and KMS teams now eagerly await a new year of expansion and development.

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Turkish Aid Agency TIKA donates a van to KMS

In 2010, KMT introduced a transport service for students at the Kaghan Memorial School to enable families that do not live within walking distance of the campus, and that cannot afford the costs of transport, to send their children to school. KMS had five local jeeps transporting children between home and school during the 2011 academic year, with some of the jeeps making two pick and drop runs each morning and afternoon to provide the service to as many children as possible. More than half of the 272 children enrolled in the school in 2011 were using this facility. This service is part of the school's effort to provide comprehensive care to its students and it ensures that logistical difficulties of getting to school do not become a hurdle in the way of any child's schooling.

With student strength increasing each year, and due to the high maintenance and running costs of the local jeeps currently being used by the school, KMT has been trying to find more efficient forms of transport for the KMS student pick and drop service. In this regard KMT approached the Turkish International Cooperation and Development Agency (TIKA) in the summer of 2011, with a request for the

donation of a school van for the children. Following a review of this application at the local level and by the TIKA Head Office in Turkey, we are now happy to report that the grant of a brand new 15-seater Toyota Hiace van was approved in November, and the vehicle and its keys were formally handed over to the KMT Managing Trustee by TIKA representative to Pakistan, Ms. Elif Türkislamoglu, at a small ceremony in Islamabad on December 30, 2011.

This generous donation in kind has a monetary value of US\$ 37,863 (equivalent to Pak. Rs. 3,439,000), and it will substantially boost the outreach of our school's educational programme by

allowing more children from remote villages the opportunity to study at KMS.

We are looking forward to introducing the new van into the school on its maiden journey on March 12, 2012, when the new academic year commences. TIKA has been supporting social and economic development in Pakistan through project-based funding since March 2010. We would like to thank TIKA and Ms. Türkislamoglu for the invaluable support that they have extended to the Kaghan Memorial School and its efforts to foster the development of the communities of the Kaghan Valley.


Kaghan Memorial School. This donation helps expand the educational infrastructure at KMS and shall allow the school to accommodate 34 additional children.

KMT started the construction of the classroom in October 2011, and plans to complete and commission it for use in May 2012. The classroom will be part of the school's second academic block that

will contain six classrooms, two activity rooms, one staff room, washrooms and storage facilities.

IBM donates more KidSmart computers




donation is in addition to the two computers that KMS received from IBM in December 2008.

The Kaghan Memorial Trust has once again received a generous donation from IBM's 'KidSmart Early Learning Programme'. The programme was launched in 2006 to promote and support the effective use of new technologies for school children. The aim is also to reduce the "digital divide" that separates children who do have access to IT from those who do not. The programme operates in partnership with education providers, Ministries of Education, as well as non-profit organisations specialised in education in over 50 countries worldwide.

IBM has selected KMT as one of their recipients under the KidSmart Programme for 2011, and has donated six Young Explorer computers to the Kaghan Memorial School. This

For the students of KMS, the KidSmart systems provide an excellent opportunity to familiarise themselves with computers. The children discover and learn in a fun way through the software programs and educational exercises that come bundled with each KidSmart computer. The use of these colourful computers is the first contact that our students have with such tools, and familiarising them with computers at an early age will be an important step in their future schooling. Whereas KMT has been introducing its students to the two original KidSmarts in groups over the past couple of years, the addition of the six new computers will enable the children to spend considerably more



individual time on the systems, thereby significantly improving the effectiveness of the school's introductory computer sessions.

KMT is indebted to IBM for its continued support of our school and its educational programme.

Stanley Pharmaceuticals helps keep KMS students healthy

In October 2011, Stanley Pharmaceuticals donated 100 bottles

each of different vitamin, mineral and calcium supplements to the Kaghan Memorial School. This donation came very timely as many of the children started coming to school with colds and runny noses.

Vitamins and minerals are essential for the physical and mental development of children, and unfortunately many of the children at

This is why KMT provides its students with weekly vitamin and mineral supplements in addition to their daily school lunches, all year round, to counter common colds and to help the children grow healthy and perform better in class.

Asia Foundation - Book Donation...

...and the meaning of these books for KMS's students

The Kaghan Memorial School is sincerely grateful to the Asia Foundation



for their continual support in the form of book donations. The Asia Foundation has been contributing to the development of the KMS Library since the opening of the school in 2008. KMS has been developing its library with the long-term plan that it will one day be able to cater for not only the school, but also the wider community. This will be the only facility of its kind in the Kaghan Valley.

The Asia Foundation has donated more than 1,400 books to KMS so far, including the latest contribution of 106 booklets received in two carton bookstands in October. These reading materials provide essential support to the teachers' lesson planning and implementation, and they also help expose our children to the outside world. As KMS is an activity-based school, the books have proven to be essential learning resources that

complement our curriculum and teaching training courses.

To give some examples of how Asia Foundation's books are heavily integrated in lessons, recently KG has been studying "The Very Hungry Caterpillar.". Using this learning resource, they have been reviewing their high frequency words and the concept of sequencing. Grade One have been studying "Hello, Mr Fox" in Art, which has taught them about contrasting colours, and has allowed their imaginations to blossom. When learning about plot and characters, Grade Two studied "Laughing Day" by Joy Cowley. This book was an extremely useful learning resource, and provided the framework for their class performance at this year's Annual Day. Grade Three has a rotated selection of Asia Foundation books in their classrooms. Once they have completed their work, their teacher encourages them to take a book and sit quietly and read to themselves.

KMT Winter Social 2011

KMT hosted its Winter Social on the chilly evening of November 25, 2011. Scheduling problems had necessitated that the event be organised towards the end of November this year, rather than KMT's traditionally preferred month of October, and consequently the night was billed as a 'Winter Social' as opposed to the 'Autumn Socials' of previous years.

The open-air garden venue was, as usual, beautifully decorated with elaborate and tasteful floral arrangements, lighting and fabric panels in keeping with a theme of winter and fire. Extensive heating

arrangements for the night kept guests comfortable under the clear winter sky while enjoying pleasant conversation, a five-star dinner and music played by a DJ from Karachi.

More than 200 guests attended this exciting and fun-filled event, with most staying on till well into the night as they contributed to help KMT raise over Rs. 500,000 in net savings from the evening.

The Kaghan Memorial School's Annual Day celebrations were held on Sunday, October 16, 2011, a beautiful autumn day ideal for outdoor performances. This




annual event strengthens the relation of the school with the local community that it is serving, and it enables families of the students to see what their children have been learning in class.

KMS was very pleased with the turn out to this year's Annual Day. The event was well attended by parents, siblings and extended family members of the children and local teachers. Fathers, grandfathers, brothers and uncles typically attend school functions. However, in this Annual Day, the KMS team was very pleased to see the many female family members that attended in much larger numbers than previous years. This is a positive development that shows that the women of the community are gradually starting to take an interest in the initiatives and activities introduced by KMT and the school. Such events and programmes had never been organised in the Kaghan Valley in the past. The festive atmosphere brought smiles to everyone's faces.

The children and teachers were very busy in the weeks leading up to the big show. The students rehearsed every day so that their performances would be perfect in front of their family and friends and there was also a flurry of activity as everyone worked to make costumes and find necessary props. The skits called for a variety of props from tiger tails to a tiara to a magic mirror, and everything needed to be found or made. A lot of hard work went into the preparations, but it was well worth it when all the performances ran successfully and smoothly.

The skits were performed in both Urdu and English, and on a range of subjects that covered Science, Islamiyat and Social Studies. The younger students sang a variety of children's songs and nursery rhymes, accompanied with simple dance steps and actions. Kindergarten learnt to perform traditional Pakistani provincial dances, and Grade 1 learned how to sing some songs. The older students adapted stories



and poems that they had learnt during the year into presentations and performances of more complex plays and skits. Both Grade 2 and 3 learnt how to write and perform scripted plays.

The most popular performance of the day was Grade 3's rendition of Snow White and the Seven Dwarves. As the



oldest children, they were able to put on the most elaborate performance. The dwarves were definitely an audience favourite, with their face paint and musical number. The magic mirror, Prince Charming and the poisoned apple had the audience captivated, and children giggled as the Evil Queen went into a fit of rage before her demise.

KMT Trustee Syed Junaid Qasim opened and closed the ceremony. He thanked the guests for supporting their children on this special day and invited them for refreshments and an opportunity to discuss their children's education and progress with the KMS academic and administrative teams. The day served as an excellent opportunity to increase communication between the school and the students' families and to showcase what the children have been learning.


New Admissions for 2012

As KMS neared the end of a successful 2011 academic year, the school began its annual admissions process for the next year for one new kindergarten class of seventeen boys and seventeen girls. Student interviews were held on Saturday, December 3, 2011, and around 130 applicants lined up patiently outside the interview room. This was the first time in KMT's history that we had enough girl applicants to fill all vacant spaces in the first round of interviews. The large number of applicants for the limited spaces available in the school is indicative of the school becoming increasingly popular within the community, while the significant

number of female applicants reflects the increasing willingness of parents to educate their girls. This is a very positive outcome for KMT as we strive to provide quality education equally to girls and boys.

While KMT would ideally like to admit all children who want to benefit from the quality schooling offered at KMS, practical limitations do not allow for this, unfortunately, and a selection therefore has to be made from amongst the applications

received. The applicant children met with the STAs and local teachers who spoke individually to each child and their accompanying guardians and selections were made based on these meetings. KMS strives to cater for the most vulnerable and marginalised children of the Kaghan Valley and therefore has a clearly defined admissions policy which aims to give available seats in the school to children from families who need the most help. This policy was followed when selecting the 34 children for the next year.



Student Profile

Sobia Nazir, Grade 3B



10-year-old Sobia Nazir from Grade 3B is one of the most popular girls in school. She lives in Kawai with her four siblings, and since her mother passed away, she plays a very mature and responsible role at home, helping

her father with her younger brothers and sisters.

At school Sobia is very studious, and has never failed to impress her teachers. She received straight A examination results in both sets of mid-term and final examinations this year and she is always the first to raise her hand in class with an answer for every question. She is also one of the best English speakers in her class, and loves learning new words. Her favourite part of English is the free discussion at the beginning of each class when she can share her opinions on what

is happening at school. Her enthusiasm and passion for learning are infectious.

Not only is Sobia popular among her teachers, she also has many friends. Her brother, Daniyal, is in the same class and they get along very well. She is never far from her best friend Sadaf, and the two girls love playing together. At break, lunchtime and after school, Sobia can be seen playing cricket. It is her favourite sport and Sobia is the driving force behind getting together a girls' cricket team for inter-house competitions next year.

The Kaghan Memorial Trust (KMT) is a non-profit Charitable Trust registered in Islamabad in January 2006 in the aftermath of the 2005 earthquake in Northern Pakistan.

The sole immediate objective of the Trust is to establish and operate the Kaghan Memorial School in the Kaghan Valley of Northern Pakistan. This School offers a first-class education to children of this underdeveloped region that was severely hit by the earthquake. Through the provision of quality education, KMT contributes towards sustainable long-term development in the Kaghan Valley.

About the School

The Kaghan Memorial School (KMS) is the first of its kind in Pakistan, in that the highest quality of education is being made freely available to some of the poorest children in the country. When fully built, the resources and facilities being provided and developed in this school will rival those at the best institutions in Pakistan.

The Kaghan Memorial School is dedicated to the memory of the thousands of children who lost their lives to the earthquake.
